# Happy 100<sup>TH</sup> Birthday, Mary!



Mary Shivvers was born in a hospital in Seattle Washington on **March 15,1920**. She had one sister. Mary's family moved to Portland OR, Hollywood CA, Glendale AZ, San Francisco CA and then to Phoenix AZ. She graduated from Phoenix Union High School in 1938, which at the time was the largest high school west of the Mississippi.

Mary attended University of Arizona, majoring in Home Economics with a minor in History of Art. During her sophomore year she met her future husband, John Thomas. Mary and John were married on November 27, 1942. John left for Panama with the National Guard and Mary stayed in Tucson until she graduated.

Mary and John had two children, John Edward (Eddie) and Elizabeth (Libbi). Eddie was killed in Vietnam; Libbi lives here in the valley. Libbi was in the Air Force for 12 years. Mary has two grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Among other places they lived while in the military, John and Mary spent two years in Guam, three years in England and two years in Iran. The family moved to Mesa in 1977 after John retired from service.

No matter where Mary lived, she was always involved in the Girl Scouts. Mary is the only living person to receive the Girl Scout Golden Eagle Award. She attended the first International Girl Scout Camp in New York, representing Arizona. Mary has stayed active with the Girl Scouts since moving to Mesa.

John and Mary were charter members of MOAA (known as TROA) when it was established in 1975. They were very active with the chapter, attending all the meetings and functions. After John passed Mary continued to attend the chapter dinner meetings and is the oldest active member of our chapter! Mary is an active member of our Ladies Auxiliary, attending the luncheons and helping with the Auxiliary projects. We are so happy Mary still enjoys coming to our functions, because we sure do enjoy her!

**Personal Affairs** *Greg Moore* 



Those of you who use the VA Medical Center on Indian School Rd know the challenges of parking. Arriving after 0900 or so for an appointment lends new meaning to the term "walker stalker." The ground lot and the garage will be filled. The VA is enrolling in excess of 1200 patients a month for medical care in the wintertime... Enough for a new clinic.

Two offsite lots are available for parking. One is open air at 3443 N Central and the other is a garage at 3003 N Central. Both have shuttle service every half hour but not necessarily on the half hour.

In the works is a shuttle service from the Central/Indian School Rd light rail station. I estimate that from the 101/ Apache station to the Central/Indian School station should take less than an hour and cost you \$2.00 for the round trip which may be reimbursed by the VA.

Why would you not use the VA system? Some medical conditions that are age-related in men and women are presumed to be service connected if you were on the ground in Vietnam or onboard ship off the coast (blue water navy.) Being diagnosed means money in your pocket and benefits for your survivors should you die as a result. Something to consider.





<mark>Legislative</mark> Dave Rataczak



As most of you know, the 2020 Arizona State Legislative Session kicked off January 13th. In Governor Ducey's State of the State

speech the same day, he surprised many by stating that his 2021 Executive Budget calls for full exemption of military retired pay from state taxes for some 50,000 veterans in Arizona. If approved, this \$45M Initiative will be retroactive to tax year 2020.

There are two important veterans' issues being considered by the state legislature. The first seeks an increase in funding for six additional Veteran Benefits Counselor (VBC) positions. SB1044, sponsored by Sen David Livingston calls for six new VBC's. It was passed by the Senate on February 4th and sent to the House for further action. A similar bill, HB2139, sponsored by Representative Jay Lawrence, passed the House Appropriations Committee on February 12th. Arizona needs at least twelve more VBC's. The plan is to gain approval for six this year and six more next year. This issue is on track for now.

The second issue is a proposal that calls for full exemption of military retired pay from state taxes for some 50,000 veterans in Arizona. This \$45M Initiative would be retroactive to tax year 2020. Companion bills have been introduced in both houses of the legislature. The Senate champion, Senator David Gowan, has introduced SB1237 which was been passed by the Appropriations Committee on February 4<sup>th</sup> and now goes to the full Senate for consideration. House champion, Representative Gail Griffin, has introduced HB 2676 which will have its first hearing in the Ways and Means Committee on February 19<sup>th</sup>

The tax exemption initiative contained in HB2676 is strongly supported by Governor Ducey and is considered a work force initiative in that Arizona needs to attract more veterans and retirees to meet the demands of a booming economy. There are 31 states that either have no income tax or exempt full military retired pay. To be competitive and be viewed as a military friendly state by future retirees, Arizona needs to approve this initiative.

Finally, the Governor announced efforts to eliminate occupational licensing fees for veterans and military spouses. In 2019, Arizona became the first state in the nation to grant universal recognition of out-of-state occupational licenses for new residents. These efforts will waive licensing fees for service members, their spouses and Arizona veterans. Hopefully more will be done in this year's legislature.

The Central Arizona Satellite met on Saturday, 29 February. Donna McBride, Casa Grande City Council member and Mayor Pro-tem was our guest speaker She

told us about the Resource Center in Casa Grande which assists veterans and others, the Street Sheet handout which has contact information about where help is available. Mrs. McBride also talked about affordable housing and working with the Tucson VA to use the Resource Center. She informed us the new recreation center targeted an initial membership of 700 and there are now 1,400 signed up.

Ron Perkins (from our Council of Chapters) commented on BE CONNECTED, a suicide prevention program with a central contact number. They would like to have more MOAA Chapters involved in a "Navigator Program", which is now a model for other states. Colonel Wright briefed President Donald J. Trump about the program in Washington, D.C. The program is for service members and their families. For more information contact: beconnectedaz.org.

Ron told us that MOAA is one of, if not the largest 501C3 lobby organizations for Veterans.

SMC President John Bushko told us we were going to add "Space Force" to our military organizations.

John and Ron talked about the tax deduction for Arizona Veterans and the need for all to contact their representatives.

John advised us we needed to concentrate on growth as a priority. National has a list of MOAA members in the area on a new list every month. He and Ron also stated we needed to have representation at the State Council Meeting. Local members need to be, at least, basic members of MOAA National, for our membership number. MOAA is the organization to assist Vets and their families.

We are looking for a speaker in March. The Border Patrol will provide a speaker in April.
