Greetings friends: Three things to cover this month.

1. There are three new presumptive diseases/illnesses related to agent orange exposure-bladder cancer, hyperthyroidism, and parkinsonian-like symptoms. If you have been diagnosed with any of these three, contact your VA pcp with regard to a rating physical.

2. A caregiver of a veteran who has a VA rating of 70% or greater and has difficulty performing his/her ADLs (activities of daily living) (feeding self, toileting, walking etc) may now be eligible for compensation by the VA for caregiving. This can be as much as \$2700/mo. No training/license is required. Stay tuned for more information.

3. Toys for Tots. The SMC Board has approved a change in the program for our chapters Toys for Tots drive. In the past we had members bring toys to the dinner meeting for subsequent distribution to the marines at Luke AFB for their program. Due to meeting changes, shopping difficulties for some, etc we will now send a contribution to the program from the chapter membership. **Please send your donation to me made out to SMC, MOAA with Toys for Tots on the subject line.** Your cancelled check will be your receipt.

Send your generous contribution to **Greg Moore PA, 1581 W. Corona Dr, Chandler AZ 85224** by DECEMBER 7th. Last year Toys for Tots served 31,500 children in Maricopa and Pinal counties with over 36,800 toys. Many working families grapple with how to manage their childcare needs as the COVID-19 pandemic continues. According to Child Care Aware of America, 35% of childcare centers and 21% of family childcare programs remain closed nationwide. Why does this matter to military families? After all, don't they have their own childcare system?

TAKE ACTION: Ask Your Lawmaker to Pass Child Care Stabilization Funding

Breaking Down the Numbers

There are approximately 800,000 military children under age 5. The military's child development centers (CDCs) only serve 25%, or 200,000, of these children. The other 600,000 are receiving care outside of CDCs. When CDCs are at capacity, military families can opt to use their service's fee assistance program through Child Care Aware of America to receive a subsidy for childcare.

The closures, increased expenses, and dwindling options within the civilian sector are impacting military families that get their care on the economy. DoD recognizes that childcare "enhances force readiness" and is a critical benefit to recruit and retain service members. According to the Blue Star Families Annual Military Family Lifestyle Survey, childcare is a top quality of life concern for military families. It is clear the lack of childcare options and increasing cost of childcare could impact military recruitment, retention, and force readiness.

COVID-19 Relief

To stabilize the U.S. childcare industry, Congress needs to invest a substantial amount in financial relief. Child Care Aware of America states \$50 billion is needed to "help keep providers in business and make childcare more affordable for families". There is bipartisan support to provide childcare relief funding. In July, the House passed H.R. 7027, the Child Care is Essential Act, which would provide the \$50 billion in relief. While the Senate is supportive of childcare stabilization funding, disagreements over the bottom-line number have delayed passage of this critical bill. It is unclear whether this will be considered in upcoming COVID-relief packages. Timing is critical to secure stabilization funding. Passing childcare stabilization funding now will allow families to go back to work, enhance our economy, and improve military family readiness.

Take Action! Ask your member of Congress to pass childcare stabilization funding now.

Not only will this help the civilian community, it will also help our active duty families in need.

Arlington National Cemetery

The public comment period on the Federal Register to address dramatic reductions for eligibility to Arlington National Cemetery (ANC) will close Nov. 16th. Some members of Congress are watching the volume of comments to gauge interest, making it even more important to make your voice heard. Non-contiguous federal land is available for expansion of the cemetery. MOAA will continue to encourage members and others to comment. So go directly to the comment page on the MOAA HQ website, or you can read the full proposed rule and make your comments there by clicking the "SUBMIT A FORMAL COMMENT" button in the upper right corner. It is important for your comments to be yours alone, not the product of mass mailings. Use your own words to explain how this affects you.

What Is Next? When the Federal Register public comment closes, it will take over a year to reconcile and resolve legal challenges before approval. Existing ANC standards will remain in effect during that time. Intervention from elected officials may be required to

change course for reduced eligibility for our national cemetery. Congressional staff members have already indicated It is not too early to reach out to your elected officials and voice your concerns.

TAKE ACTION: Submit a Comment | Contact Your Lawmaker

HEALTHCARE UPDATE MOAA appreciates DoD's pause on reform and reassessment of the availability of civilian healthcare. But legislation is needed to ensure robust analysis and mitigation planning throughout the implementation process to protect your access to care. Please contact your elected officials and urge them to support language in the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act that would halt medical restructuring and billet reductions while increasing reporting requirements and congressional oversight.

Getting To Know Your Chapter Board Members



An Autobiography of Capt Al Anderer, USAF, Former



I grew up in Philadelphia (Fly, Eagles, Fly!) and graduated from high school in 1959. As a senior, I had no idea what I wanted to study and requested & received an appointment to the Air Force Academy. I graduated in 1963 with a B.S. degree and a major in Public Affairs, as well as a commission as a 2nd lieutenant.

My military active duty started with 20 months of pilot training at Moody AFB, GA (where I met my wife), and C-130 training at Sewart AFB, TN. Then it was off to Columbus, OH, and Lockbourne AFB. I was stationed there but spent most of my time TDY to Evreux, France, and flying throughout Europe, North Africa and the Middle East. There were several trips to the Dominican Republic, transporting the 82nd Airborne Division in 1965. I also rotated to the Panama Canal Zone where we stood on alert and traveled throughout South America.

At the beginning of February 1966, while flying north at 22,000 ft. over Quito, Ecuador, a familiar voice came on the air and gave me instructions to switch to a private frequency. It was one of my roommates heading south at 21,000 ft. He gave me the news that we both had orders for Okinawa with departure in November 1966. Paula and I were engaged in February and married during May in her hometown of Atlanta, GA. I left for Naha AB, Okinawa, in June of 1966. (I'll leave for another time the story of the departure date and marriage date sliding closer and closer).

From June of 1966 I flew out of Naha AB on the southern tip of Okinawa. The normal mission was to rotate to Cam Ranh Bay for 15 days, ferrying troops and supplies in country. Our primary focus was SVN with occasional trips to other SE Asia locations. No C-130s were permanently stationed in SVN. Almost all were TDY from Okinawa, Taiwan & Japan (Okinawa was still occupied by the US at that time).

In addition to the everyday mission of hauling and occasionally dropping troops & supplies, the rest of my 33-month tour was broken up by two 45-day TDYs to Ubon, Thailand, flying "Blind Bat," a flare/FAC mission to destroy and disrupt truck traffic along the Ho Chi Minh Trail. At the start of the mission in 1965 out of Da Nang, each C-130 operated as part of a four-ship formation, along with a pair of B-57 bombers and a Marine EF-10 for electronic-countermeasure support. Whether the group operated over North Vietnam or over Laos, the C-130 would drop flares on truck traffic while the B-57s bombed and the EF-10 jammed enemy radars. In 1966 the operation was moved from Da Nang to Ubon after several C-130s were lost to a mortar attack, and the mission was moved further south along the trail as stronger & more robust anti-aircraft fire was encountered. The mission used the call signs Blind Bat & Lamp Lighter and changed to 6 or 7 hours along the trail as a flare/FAC operation from 6 pm to 6 am each night. The C-130s were no longer accompanied by the B-57s and EF-10 and often encountered 37mm flack traps. One gun would fire, and two others would triangulate on the first set of tracers. The 3 sets of tracers crisscrossing would provide wider and more complete defensive coverage. In addition to the B-57s that would be scheduled to fly with us, many of the aircraft we worked with, Air Force, Navy & Marine, had been on bombing runs up North and still had munitions to drop before returning to base. Occasionally we worked with the Air Commandos out of Nakhon Phanom, Thailand, when they needed more flare support. After my second Ubon tour and about 350 hours and 54 missions over Laos, 11 into NVN, my Blind Bat missions were over. It was back to the Cam Ranh Bay grind for the rest of 1968 and into 1969.

I was due to separate from the service in mid-March 1969, but my squadron managed to squeeze in one last 15-day TDY tour in February. After 33 months of this, I expected the last tour to be like all of the others; however, in order to get my broken aircraft out of forward Army airfields (mortar bait in the vernacular of our Army comrades), I wound up having to make two 3-engine takeoffs at sundown in the last week of the tour. I completed 957 combat sorties and just over 1500 hours of combat time.

After separation most of my feather merchant life was filled with sales management positions with Federal Express & Greyhound Corporation, as well as my own recruiting company.

Now my time with family, Vietnam Veterans of America, Military Officers Association of America, and volunteering with Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, and just added TLC Brotherhood membership (Thailand, Laos, Cambodia). My Georgia Peach and I have two children and two grandchildren, all in Arizona. Paula & I have lived in Arizona since 1981, but have lived in New Jersey, Atlanta, and Chicago since separating from the service.
