Legislative Ritt Schiano

MILITARY PAY RAISE - The Bureau of Labor and Statistics (BLS) reported its

quarterly Employment Cost Index (ECI) figures Oct. 30, providing an idea where the pay raise may be for military members at the start of 2022. That amount is 2.7%.

As a recap, the FY2021 NDAA pay raise before Congressional Committees, once the Continuing Resolution is resolved and we have a budget, is 3% effective January 2021. For most years (but not all), the raise is the same as the ECI reported. For retirees, the amount is 1.3%. The previous year retirees received 1.6%. But with a \$3 trillion budget deficit, and more COVID relief to come, everything will be looked at. So, there are no guarantees 2022 will reflect the ECI.

From MOAA HQ on the NDAA - MOAA needs our members and readers to stay alert on what is happening to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) and the appropriations process. So, keep pressing Congress agree on some sort of COVID Relief.

Over 100 Representatives Call on NDAA Conferees to Add Agent Orange Presumptives - More than 100 representatives released a letter to House and Senate Armed Services Committee leadership urging them to retain the addition of bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and Parkinsonism to the list of conditions presumed connected to Agent Orange exposure as part of the FY 2021 National Defense to pass the NDAA, and let your officials know it is time for lawmakers to finish their work in the 116th Congress. This has become very complicated and contentious as they also try to Authorization Act (NDAA).

Note from MOAA: Language adding three conditions to the list of Agent Orange presumptives is under threat as National Defense Authorization Act negotiations move forward. More than ever, it's critical to call and write your lawmakers TODAY to encourage their support .- Below is a list of contacts for you to use to let our lawmakers know where we stand on these important issues.

Superstition Mountain Express Chapter Members Christmas Tast and Present, Traditions, and Stories



December 25, 1966 #74 Yokota, Ojana, Ginowan City, Okinawa-Ryukyu Islands, Pacific

We were married in May of 1966. Al had to leave soon after our honeymoon for his assignment to Naha AB, Okinawa. I followed in November and Al carried me over the threshold of our first home. We lived off-base near an Okinawan village in a neighborhood with contractors from other countries, but there were a few couples from our base there as well. We did have a neighbor across the street who kept me company when Al was TDY. Her name was Hana and her husband, Buddy, was also in the Air Force, but stationed at another base. Hana was from Germany and still spoke with a heavy German accent.

Our little home was at the end of Yakota St. The crushed coral rock road in our neighborhood wound around our home on the corner, so I always knew AI was home when I heard the crew van pull up to our side door!

As the holidays approached in 1967, duty called. Al would be gone for Christmas. I knew that I would be included with friends, but it wouldn't be the same without Al. We decorated the pine tree outside our home with large colored bulbs! That was our Christmas tree. Then Al was gone.

Christmas Eve found me lonely and sad. Hana called to say that Al had left my Christmas gift with her. It was cold outside as I hurried across the road. Hana welcomed me with a hug as she always did. She sent me to get my present off her bed. The room was dark, but I could see the light streaming down the hallway glinting on shiny black boots and flight suit zippers. Al had made it back home! I never heard the crew van!

As we left Hana and Buddy's home, we held each other to stay warm. I looked up at our beautiful Christmas tree through tears and noticed that it was snowing. Unbelievable – Christmas snow in Okinawa! Perfect Christmas! **Paula and Al Anderer**





One of my most memorable Christmas times was on the gunline in December of 72. We were firing 24/7 but pulled out to sea for a couple of visitors. Our flight deck couldn't land a large helo, so they horse-collared down to the deck. Christmas 1971



This was the year I returned from Vietnam and we were stationed at Ft. Rucker, AL. This was our first Christmas with our 15-month-old daughter, Leah.

A little background, I was assigned to Ft Rucker, AL as a UH-1 (Huey) Instructor Pilot, with the Department of Graduate Flight Training, Rotary Wing Qualification Course, Utility Branch. Our mission was to provide transition training into rotor wing aircraft for fixed wing qualified Military aviators. Unique at this time, the Army was training Air Force and Navy pilots, along with NASA (astronauts). This combination created an interesting group of students. Their backgrounds ranged from fighters, transports, bombers, and reconnaissance aircraft, such as the U-2. The diversity of these students created a very interesting and challenging environment for the Instructor Pilot. These students had never had a working relationship with Warrant Officers, particularly, the Air Force, who did not

know what a Warrant Officer was!

This phase of the Rotary Wing Qualification Course was a four-week program in which we provided 27 hours of flight time to each student. During the month of December, our goal was to complete this training in three weeks, to allow the students to take leave for Christmas and New Year's. This resulted in a very busy schedule for the instructor and student. Peggy kept reminding me we needed to get a Christmas tree, since this was our first family Christmas together. Of course, I didn't listen very well and kept delaying the purchase of a tree. After all, I was very busy, trying to complete this four-week course in three weeks. (Peggy's comment: He ONLY worked half a day!!) Finally we go to the tree lot NOT a tree to be had!!! We checked all Christmas tree lots in the area and the PX didn't have any artificial trees left. So now, the pressure is on. Peggy tells me "I told you so", Leah is not going to have a tree for Christmas and Peggy is P_____O__! But never underestimate in the ingenuity of the Army Warrant Officer!!! Part of the RWQC training includes operating in confined areas. These confined areas at Ft. Rucker are surrounded by knotty pine trees. I decide to "harvest" a Christmas tree from the confined area during the next training session. This is where things get a little unusual. I go to the crash rescue truck and borrow the rescue saw, which is like a big skill saw with a gasoline motor. My two students and I fly to the confined areas and are unable to find a tree at ground level. Now comes the creativeness.....we decide we can cut the top off a 60 ft tall pine tree. I hover next to the top of the tree, with the cargo door open. Both students, an Air Force O-6 and an Army O-4, are in the cargo department. The O-4 grabs the top of the tree and pulls into the cargo department as I hover sideways into the tree. The O-6 starts the crash rescue saw and separates the treetop from the tree! Back to the stage field we head to return the rescue saw. After returning the saw, we finished our training period and returned to Hanchey Army Heliport. There were about 200 helicopters based at Hanchey. After securing the aircraft, my students helped me carry the tree across the ramp, through Flight Operations and to my Volkswagen bug. After securing the tree to my Volkswagen, which was green so it helped camouflage the tree, then I arrive home, bring the tree in.....Peggy takes one look and asked, "What the h____ is that"? For all the creative effort, this treetop did not look like a Christmas tree. There was not a straight branch or trunk to be seen. It was impossible to level the tree, and it looked extremely sparse. On went the lights, decorations and finally the tinsel. It was the saddest Christmas Tree you have ever seen!!!! But we had the most beautiful tree to celebrate our little family's first Christmas together. Arlan & Peggy Allen

A story of what I have been up to during the COVID season...



I have been catching up with a number of projects I started way back in 2002, or there abouts. With a somewhat dwindling memory, I cannot remember when they were actually started.
