All veterans that are signed up for healthcare through the VA and have a medical card can get their Covid vaccinations at the VA. Call 602-277-5551 to get an appointment. You may be on hold for a half an hour or more but eventually you will get an appointment.

Things to remember...

When a veteran dies these documents will be needed and should be kept on hand.

- Full name
- SS and/or service number
- Date and place of birth
- Retired rank
- Date of retirement
- Disability rating (military/VA)
- Circumstances surrounding the death
- Next of kin
- Copy of DD214
- Copy of Death Certificate



Legislative Ritt Schiano

Much has transpired with the new year and new Administration.

MOAA shares many of the interest areas with congressional leaders and looks forward to helping Congress address these matters either through legislation or oversight hearings:

- Implementing the VA MISSION Act. The
 massive bill will take years to implement but will
 result in more options where veterans can
 receive care, expand caregiver programs to
 veterans of all eras, enhance VA's workforce
 capabilities, and modernize medical facilities.
- Expanding access to care for veterans in rural communities.
- Implementing several critically important measures signed into law in 2020. These MOAA-supported laws address the rising rates of mental health conditions and veteran suicides, as well as provide health care and benefit improvements for veterans, particularly those in need.
- Implementing the joint VA-DoD electronic health record. This long-sought move would allow clinicians to easily access veterans' medical information.
- Eliminating health disparities for women, minority, and underserved veterans.
- Assessing the impact of COVID-19 on VA's workforce. MOAA has worked with Congress in recent years to strengthen and modernize the VA workforce and to fill ongoing critical employee shortages.

MILITARY RETIREMENT PAY EXEMPTION

31 States already exempt military retirement pay from state taxes. South Carolina, Kentucky, Georgia and Maryland are considering bills to exempt military retirement pay. Maryland also has additional bills that would partially exempt retirement pay if the one for full exemption fails. Montana has a bill to exempt 50% off the pay from state taxes.

Arizona currently exempts the first \$3500 of military retirement pay. Last year the governor included full exemption in his budget. But COVID

hit. Bills are active to fully exempt retirement pay, but there is little support from the Legislature.

TRICARE DENTAL PROGRAM

The FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) stops the planned transition of active duty and National Guard/Reserve families who use the TRICARE Dental Program (TDP) to the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP). MOAA supports this move and will continue working to ensure Congress and the Defense Health Agency (DHA) remain committed to addressing known problems with TDP networks. There are no changes to retiree dental and vision coverage — military retirees are still eligible for FEDVIP.

New VA Secretary

Denis McDonough 's confirmation February 8th as the new VA secretary received overwhelming bipartisan support – an 87-7 vote. The new secretary outlined several of his priorities, many of which are in line with MOAA's and those of other veterans' organizations. MOAA's ongoing efforts to improve the VA were included in a recent letter to President Joe Biden, and were outlined further in a recap of veteran health care priorities.

REINTRODUCTION OF THE MAJOR STAR ACT

Nine days after Major Richard Star, USAR, lost his battle with cancer from toxic exposure, Sens. Jon Tester (D-Mont.) and Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) reintroduced the Major Richard Star Act (S. 344) with 42 Senators as original cosponsors.

The legislation will authorize concurrent receipt of DoD retired pay and VA disability for those injured in a combat zone and forced to medically retire under Chapter 61. The Major Richard Star Act would fix the unfair offset that prevents thousands of veterans living with the wounds of war from accessing both their disability benefits and retired pay. The Military Coalition, a group of 35 organizations (including MOAA) representing more than 5.5 million servicemembers, veterans, their families, and survivors, wrote a letter of support for the bill to the House and Senate Armed Services Committees.



War Stories



"War Stories" can mean a number of things: stories about actual war incidents, remembrances of activities while in the service, and exaggerated accounts of happenings as we remember them. "The older I get, the more I remember, with greater clarity, things that never happened."

The following actually happened – honest!

In 1967 I was a copilot of a C-130 flying out of Ubon, Thailand, as part of Operation Blind Bat. This was a flare/FAC mission chasing trucks along the Ho Chi Minh Trail. We would drop

flares on trucks and suspected supply depots and then direct fighters on these targets. Missions were long: 7-8 hours in early evening or early morning, covering all nighttime hours. At the end of our mission, we would always climb to an altitude of around 15,000 feet before flying across Laos to Thailand. This would be accomplished by flying in a circle while gaining altitude.

Early one morning we started our climb, and the aircraft commander said I had control of the aircraft as he left his seat to relieve himself in the back of the aircraft. As we circled you could look down at the ground and it was pitch black; however, the sky above was turning light blue. We must have picked an area just above a 37mm anti-aircraft site, and our third pass above this site was just too tempting to pass up. The 37mm was accurate to about 8,000 feet and then would explode on contact or upon reaching 15,000 feet. As we continued the climb, a clip of five 37mm shells fanned in front of our aircraft within about 10 feet! They looked like beer cans on fire with sparks falling off. I grabbed the controls and made some erratic gyrations, moving the wings right and left, before turning the aircraft to the west toward Thailand. Our flight engineer sat between and behind the pilot and copilot. We looked at each other in shock and didn't say a word. About that time the pilot casually approached his seat and as he began to sit down looked at me with my mouth open and eyes as big as saucers. He then glanced at the flight engineer and saw the same look. "Oh, something really happened. I thought you were trying to get me to pee down my leg." The incident ended with a burst of laughter from all of us. **Al Anderer**

USS Hancock



Thinking of a suitable memory to share from my enlisted time in the Navy, my mind went back in time to when the USS Hancock was on a WESTPAC deployment in late 1964. I was standing on the edge of the port side of the flight deck, forward of the island structure, gazing out to sea after flight ops had shut down.

All the birds were secure, and I had a few moments to do some wool gathering, before I needed to attend to working on any aircraft write-up the pilots might have submitted after recovery. It was one of those rare times when you can become captivated by the beauty of the moment-the electric blue sea was so calm that it was as glass as far as the eye could see, there was

just enough of a breeze that you did not feel too hot under the sun in a cloudless sky, and the carrier had a gentle such rolling motion that you wanted to lay down and take a nap.

Suddenly, out of the corner of my eye, I caught sight of a school of fling fish break water near the bow of the ship and glide (fly?) well over the length of a football field away. Given that the flight deck of the Hancock was 63ft off the water, for the fish to register so clearly, they must have been at least two feet in length. The mood was broken when the Division Chief bellowed my name that he had some work for me. **Ed Fox**

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
