Our forever-a-Marine member, George Meegan, related a personal encounter with a double amputee in the gym which caused him to pause and reflect. For the good of the Chapter, the Newsletter would like to share his reflection.

We are all aware of our personal bodies, daily, and the messages which we receive that tell us that something is just not working well. Sore knees, elbows, fingers, etc. A nagging stiff neck, or a bad bruise. A "hitch in our git along", so to speak.

George was at the gym, thinking of his sore knees, when he noticed a man near his own age who had only half of his left arm and half of his left leg. The amputee was working out with vigor. He was not a vet. He was a civilian who nearly lost his life in a motorcycle accident. Whatever his motivation, this person reminded George of the Marine Corps philosophy - "Suck it up and continue to march!"

George acknowledges that we all have our physical difficulties and challenges. However, he would like everyone to be encouraged, as was he, by an 80-year-old with half an arm and half a leg who is not giving up or feeling sorry for himself. He is sucking it up and continuing to march in his own way!

Thank you, George, for inspiring all of us to look beyond ourselves and be thankful for our blessings!



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Thomas Jefferson attended The College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA. When he enrolled in 1760 at age 16, he was already proficient in the classics and could read the Latin and Greek authors in the original language. He did so for all of the rest of his life. Jefferson was influenced by the Enlightenment and the philosophy of John Locke, and incorporated some of those ideas in the Declaration. His greatest influences, however, were Dr. William Small of Scotland and George Wythe, the first Law Professor at William and Mary. Dr. Small was his Mathematics professor who was skilled in all the sciences and very eager to communicate all he knew to Jefferson. Jefferson read law under George Wythe for five years. He was a "man for all seasons." He visited the Governor's House as a young man with his mentors and even played the violin and cello there for entertainment.

On June 11, 1776, Thomas Jefferson was appointed to a 5-man committee which was tasked with drafting a formal document which would justify the colonies' break with Great Britain. He was 33 years-old, had a beautiful handwriting style with quill and ink. He was the obvious choice to draft such an important document. The other members of the committee were John Adams-MA, Benjamin Franklin-PA, Robert Livingston-NY and Roger Sherman-CT. Jefferson was given 17 days to draw up the document, due to the fact that the Congress was so busy. The draft included corrections by John Adams and Benjamin Franklin. Although the Declaration was considered the collective work of the Continental Congress; however, in the 1790's Jefferson was recognized as its principal author.

The Declaration was approved on July 4, 1776, but not signed until nearly a month later because they did not have the approval of all 13 colonies until July 9. The founding fathers knew very well what fate awaited them if they signed the document. King George III and the British Parliament would surely see it as treason. Nevertheless, they primarily signed their names on August 2, 1776, in the Pennsylvania State House, now known as Independence Hall. Others signed later. The iconic Liberty Bell resides there.

The last sentence of the Declaration is a promise, one to another," We mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our Sacred Honor." Some did lose their lives and their fortunes for the sake of the independence of our country. To them we all owe a great debt. It took uncommon courage to sign our Declaration of Independence.

As if to punctuate the importance of the date, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson died on July 4, 1826, while the country celebrated Independence Day. They were the last two "revolutionaries" alive. Adams' last words were, "Thomas Jefferson still survives." However, Jefferson had died at Monticello five hours earlier.

Independence Day greetings to the Superstition Mountain Chapter!

The State of Arizona has just wrapped up its legislative session. I've been covering the bills of interest since January, and we've had some successes. Here's a few more successes since last month. Approved Bills:

SB 1095 property tax exemptions: statutory conformity. 24 Jun 2022- Transmitted to the Governor

SCR 1011 constitutional property tax exemptions. 24 Jun 2022- Transmitted to the Secretary of State.

HB 2701 NOW: veterans; hunting licenses. Transmitted to the Governor

HB 2741 state licensing fee; waiver. Transmitted to Governor

SB 1346 state employees; vacation inquiries prohibited. 23 June 2022 Transmitted to Governor SB1170 G&F; tags; permits; voter registration. 07 June 2022 Signed by the Governor

HB 2010 Flags: homeowner's associations.06 June 2022 Signed by the Governor

HB2320 veterans' organization; leased property; classification. 27 May 2022 Signed by the Governor

On the federal side:

On 16 June 2022, the Senate voted 84-14 to pass a revised version of the Honoring Our Pact Act (H.R. 3967). Now it goes to the House for a re-vote.
