Dear Virginia Ferguson,

Thank you for contacting your members of Congress and urging them to address the critical funding shortfall for the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA). Your advocacy ensures our elected officials understand the importance of supporting veterans and their families.

In July, VA officials warned that the VBA faced a \$3 billion budget shortfall by the end of fiscal year 2024. Without congressional action by September 20th, compensation and benefit payments for 7 million veterans and their survivors were at risk of being delayed. Your efforts helped spur Congress into action, leading to the passage of the supplemental funding bill, which was signed into law by the president by the September 20th deadline.

Your continued engagement is vital in ensuring Congress prioritizes the needs of our nation's veterans. Together, we can make a significant impact in supporting those who have bravely served our country. Thank you again for your commitment and support.



Freedom of Speech by Norman Rockwell

Rockwell, Norman. Freedom of Speech. Feb. 20, 1943. Norman Rockwell Museum.

Norman Rockwell, Illustrator and Patriot

The famous front-page illustrator for *The Saturday Evening Post* magazine, Norman Rockwell, was very resourceful and a determined man. He was a true patriot who was Inspired by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's address to Congress in 1941, outlining four freedoms which Roosevelt felt should be enjoyed by a postwar America; freedom of speech, freedom to worship, freedom from want and freedom from fear. Rockwell envisioned illustrating each of the four freedoms on canvas.

Ideas did not come easily to Rockwell for his work. The concept of the project he was envisioning began to weigh on him; it invaded his sleep at night. How to begin? By chance one evening he stopped in on a local Council Meeting, where a lone figure stood up amongst his neighbors and voiced an unpopular opinion. That night he awoke to understand that his plan should be to do what he always did, illustrate each freedom as it was exercised every day in simple situations in his local community. Rockwell prepared some rough sketches and made plans with a fellow cover illustrator at the *Post*, Mead Schaeffer, to go to Washington to pitch the idea of more posters to help the war effort.

In the spring of 1942, the Ordnance Department of the U.S. Army had commissioned Rockwell to paint a poster of a gunner in need of ammunition. His work, entitled *Let's Give Him Enough and On Time*, was printed on posters which were sent all over the country to ordnance plants in order to spur production. The trip was ill-timed; he was dismayed to find that all resources for such things had been exhausted. Rockwell was concerned with helping with the war effort, and he was confident that his paintings would inspire people. He was deflated, but he had one more idea.

On the way back to his home in Vermont, he stopped at Curtis Publishing Company, the publisher of *The Saturday Evening Post*. He showed editor Ben Hibbs his sketches. Hibbs was excited and immediately relieved Rockwell from his current obligation to the *Post* of one cover per month for three months. Hibbs had plans to use the illustrations in the *Post* in a much more powerful way. Rockwell developed "stage fright" and It was two and a half months before he even started the project. He reckoned that Michaelangelo was better suited to it; "It was so darned high-blown."

Norman Rockwell stuck with it, and never gave up. He could not envision what happened next.


The *Four Freedoms* illustrations were published one per week for four consecutive weeks in the Post, accompanied by essays by noted writers. The first publication was *Freedom of Speech*. The *Post* received 25,000 requests for reprinting!

In May 1943, the U.S. Department of the Treasury and representatives of the *Post* announced a joint campaign to sell war bonds and stamps. They would send an Exhibit of the *Four Freedoms* paintings, one-thousand original cartoons and paintings by other illustrators, and original manuscripts from *The Saturday Evening Post* on a nationwide tour! Millions of people viewed the exhibit. One hundred thirty-three million dollars in war bonds and stamps were sold. Each buyer received prints of the four paintings.

The Office of War Information printed four million sets of posters of the paintings. Each was printed with the words "Buy War Bonds" and distributed in U.S. Schools, institutions and overseas.

The Four Freedoms original oil paintings now reside in the permanent Normal Rockwell Museum in their own special gallery where they can continue to inspire. Never give up on a good idea!



Fall Greetings to the Superstition Mountain Chapter.

Just a quick note, I will be out up through December without access to most US legislative info. So, I invite you to use the links here to stay abreast of most legislative action. National bills supported by MOAA https://moaa.quorum.us/bills and State of Arizona legislation https://dvs.az.gov/about/legislative-updates Did you know that MOAA has a series of video updates on legislation free to its members? Take a look at what is available for you. https://www.youtube.com/playlist?list=PLZJJ2z1-x q3tfOALHMIkAR pVTjEhk86 Currently, the Arizona State Legislature is in recess and US Congress are back in DC. So, at the state level, there's little activity to report. However, the state has a new Department of Veterans Services Director. His name is John Scott, and he served in the USMC as an NCO. His bio can be found at https://dvs.az.gov/about/leadership/john-scott_As I mentioned last month, MOAA asks that you take the opportunity to seek action on a number of bills currently stalled in Congress. You have seen these before in previous updates, but this request comes from MOAA National.

• Junior Enlisted Pay Raise: Competitive pay remains critical to the health of the all-volunteer force, and both the House and the Senate seek to address this issue in the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The House NDAA calls for servicemembers E-1 to E-4 to receive a 15% pay raise beyond the 4.5% earmarked for all in uniform. While the Senate version calls for an additional 1% increase for servicemembers E-1 to E-3 (beyond the 4.5% raise).

• Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) Restoration: Access to quality housing and promoting financial wellness is important to sustaining the all-volunteer force. Restoring BAH addresses both issues. The House version of the NDAA would restore BAH to 100% for FY 2025 – a move toward MOAA's goal of full repeal of the BAH reduction, but not a permanent fix. Unfortunately, the Senate version does not address the issue.

• Major Richard Star Act: Tens of thousands of combat-injured veterans lose a dollar of earned DoD retirement pay for every dollar of VA disability compensation. For three years in a row, over two-thirds of Congress has supported the Star Act, which would end that unjust financial offset. Despite this vast support, neither version of the NDAA includes the bill. However, it is critical lawmakers continue to hear about this important issue, especially as we approach the start of the 119th Congress.

How important is your involvement? Last week the Department of Veterans Affairs nearly defaulted on payments to disabled Veterans. Groups like MOAA ensured that did not happen, but the fix was only a 3 month continuing resolution. So, we have another fight looming after the election.
